

Comments:

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the recent petition advocating for Edmands Park to be designated as an off-leash dog area. Living directly across from the park for the past five years, my family's experience with the current situation involving unleashed dogs has been profoundly negative, significantly limiting our use of this public space.

Despite the park's proximity to our home, we have only felt comfortable visiting Edmands Park few times due to recurring encounters with unleashed dogs that bark at or chase us. These experiences are particularly distressing as both my wife and daughter are allergic to dogs and have previously been bitten. When we have addressed our concerns with pet owners, we are often reassured that their dogs are friendly, a response that fails to acknowledge the unpredictability of animal behavior and our genuine fear.

The proposal to officially allow dogs to roam freely within Edmands Park is alarming and feels like a direct disregard for families like mine who will feel unsafe and unwelcome in their own neighborhood park. It would force us to entirely avoid this area, thus depriving us of a valuable community asset.

We urge the city to consider the implications of such a policy on all residents, including those who are apprehensive about or unable to interact safely with dogs. We advocate for maintaining strict leash laws, or at the very least, designating specific times or zones within the park for off-leash activities to ensure that the park remains accessible and enjoyable for everyone.

Thank you for considering the voices of all constituents. We hope for a decision that upholds the safety and inclusivity of our community spaces.

Safety is important.

Agree that off-leash inhibits many people from using the park.

Dogs being off leash in Edmands Park requires constant vigilance for safety and enjoyment and is prohibitive for a lot of people to use the park. Currently I have to keep telling people to please put their dogs on a leash for everyone's safety and enjoyment; removing leash requirements would be a disaster to put it bluntly.

<p>I'm a parent of two small children. I'd like to feel confident that they will be able to walk through Edmands Park without being at risk of being bitten by a dog. I was bitten a few years ago (not at Edmands Park) by a dog. It's not right that the residents of Newton would have to wonder whether they're safe in a neighborhood park.</p>
<p>Edmands Park is a unique asset to the community. As a mother of two young children, I would never take them to an off-leash dog park for safety reasons. An on-leash park can be enjoyed by everyone. An off-leash park puts dogs first and excludes many in the community.</p>
<p>It's terrifying to be with small children and have uncontrolled off-leash dogs suddenly run up to them/you. There's no way to enjoy a park like that if you're constantly looking out for dogs.</p>
<p>It is safer for people and dogs to remain on leash in and around the park. The park is not enclosed. Dogs off leash can easily leave the park and enter abutting private yards and local streets, where they pose a hazard to others and themselves.</p>

already. Living in a property abutting Edmands park I have already had situations where dogs ran on to my property, dogs running into the street almost getting hit by cars because they were illegally unleashed. As a resident who has lived on this property since the 1980s I have watched this park become less and less welcoming as more Newton residents have grown to use this place to let their dogs run unleashed illegally. I used to walk in the park to enjoy the woods and look at the scenery as a child. Now as a parent I will not allow my children into that park because of not picking up after their dog who was probably unleashed. All the city is doing is making the City of Newton a target from a liability standpoint by making this park unleashed. The nearby school often brings young children to the park to learn about nature as I did as a child however I do not agree with the liability you are putting on the educators. I will say this, about 20 years ago a neighbor had a Doberman who attacked another dog because they were unleashed. There are already dog parks set up in the city which are fenced in which requires owners to pick up feces. Dog owners illegally unleash their dogs already and do not pick up the feces, making it legal for them to unleash their dog will encourage that behavior.

I lived at this address since the 1980's, and have seen dog owners leash their dogs going into the parks. In recent years some dogs have run out of the park into our neighborhood running down the street unleashed. If Edmonds Park is turned into a dog park it would not be welcoming to others who want to enjoy a walk in the park. Dogs should be leashed even when they are in the park. I do not agree with Edmonds Park being turned into a dog park.

There are coyotes and other wild life in the park this is another concern to take into account

We live in front of one entrance of the park. It happened several times that, while my young children were playing in the backyard, an off-leashed dog came running by. Couple of them even entered inside my house, while the backyard door was open! This happens on a time when Edmands Park is not an off-leash area. I can't imagine what would happen if the proposal is implemented. Also, even though we live right in front of it, we very rarely enjoy a stroll inside it because the majority of dogs is off-leash. Again, it is disrespectful and unpleasant to walk around with young children in this unsafe environment. Not to mention that it is very difficult to clean after an off-leash dog in a wood (I speak with experience).

I live one house away from the park and enjoy walking in the woods with my kids or walking through the woods to get to another street. We often have off-leash dogs run right up to us which makes me nervous

Having lived in Newton for over 20 years, I strongly recommend that the city establish a fenced area specifically for dog owners who wish to let their dogs off-leash, located away from residential neighborhoods. Edmands Park, which is near our community that includes both elderly residents and young children, should require dogs to remain on leashes at all times for safety and peace of mind.

I oppose the proposal to make Edmands Park leash-free. This is a safety hazard. Thank you.

While I do not abut the park, I am only a few houses from the entrance.

Our dog passed away this winter. He was always walked on a leash. I don't see any possibility for enforcing the rules that the off-leash advocates propose to implement.

I was attacked by two dogs at Edmunds Park 2 yrs back but didn't bother to report it because I didn't expect anything to be done about it.

The opening sentence of the pro-off leash proposal states: "For decades, the primary visitors of Edmands Park have been dog owners who, despite the leash law, enjoyed allowing their dogs off-leash inside the park."

I suspect that the very reason the park is occupied principally by off-leash dogs and their owners is that the park is potentially scary, hazardous, and unwelcoming for anyone that desires to take a walk in a public park without the potential encounter with an unfamiliar animal. The pro-off leash coalition may therefore be correct in saying that the off leash dog owners have successfully discouraged any other potential users of the park.

My children are teenagers now but raising them across the street from Edmands Park I was quite uncomfortable, as were they, with the idea of entering the park knowing that an unleashed dog could be around any corner, over any hill, behind any tree.

This should not be the price of using a public park in the City of Newton.

What is apparent in the pro-off leash proposal is the notion of "safe" dogs vs "dangerous" dogs which is a luxury known only to those dog owners and their fellow walkers.

The pro-off leash coalition proposals for self-policing are well intentioned but it does not change the fact that turning the park fully off leash will exclude many.

All said, I respect that Edmands Park is a unique public option for off leash use, and I would welcome specific hours for off leash use, well signed, and strictly enforced.

Off leash in an urban environment like ours is never a good idea.
Many people use the park off-leash safely but it would be good to retain the ability to ticket or in some way deter those that allow their dogs to behave in a way that poses a harm to others.
We used to walk in the park as we live nearby, but we have been jumped on by unleashed dogs so many times, we no longer walk there.
Thanks for doing this. I'm a senior and the Park is my favorite walk!
I don't bring my dog to this park anymore because the number of off leash dogs makes it unsafe. I do have concerns that there is inadequate enforcement currently.
NO to making Edmands a leash-free zone: Dogs run freely, illegally, now in Edmands Park. Maybe 1 in 30 is on a leash. To designate and advertise Edmands as an off-leash area would invite, I think, a very large influx of users. Older walkers and small children need to be able to use the park in safety. Water and wildlife need to be protected from roaming dogs---whose owners lack consideration and good sense.
Edmands is not a wise choice for an off-leash designated park. I have been walking my dog in the park for 14 years and my property also abuts the park so I know firsthand how unsafe the park is for off-leash activity.
I am not in favour of unleashed dogs in the park.

Unfortunately I have been agressed more than once by off leash dogs. I believe all dogs should be leashed at all times when they are out in public.

Off-leash dogs in the park are already a problem. Officially designating the park as off-leash would only exacerbate this problem. We have dogs in our yard regularly and the owners are not even aware that their dogs are not by their side. As recent as one week ago, we had a graduation party in the yard and a large dog came over the wall into the yard. Keeping the mixed-use designation is vital as it gives citizens a peaceful and beautiful space to do whatever it is they want and it is in line with how the land was gifted to us. edmands woods is already unusable because of dogs running free in the park.

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I greatly enjoy spending time walking in the park. However, I currently take advantage of it very little. Without fail, when I walk or run, I am approached (closely), often jumped on by an off-leash dog. It's just not pleasant. I go when I can walk very early, before the dogs come out (around 7 am). Surveying residents who currently use the park reflects a bias towards off-leash dog owners and walkers. Others have already self-selected out. It's my park as much as it's that of anyone else who lives in Newton. I should be able to use it also. Such a loss for me. Please move in the other direction, crack down on off-leash dogs! I would be open to specific off-leash hours, which would enable me to go at other times.

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I have experienced unleashed dogs run toward children in our care aggressively in ways that frightened them, and I have stepped in dog feces on more than me occasion when venturing off path. Just today, when I was crouched down adjusting my bike, an unleashed dog came close to me from behind, bared its teeth, and barked loudly at me continuously until its owner arrived. The owner barely apologized, instead accusing me of overreacting. We must enforce and keep leash laws so all human citizens of Newton can enjoy the park!

We live on a street that ends at Edmands Park. When our son was young and in a stroller in Edmands park, a large dog (off leash) jumped on him and tried to pull a cookie out of his hand. He became terrified of dogs for the next few years, to the point we had to cross the street with him if one was on the sidewalk. We absolutely do not think this should be an off leash park.

I live less than one block from Edmands Park. There have been several instances in which I have taken a walk in Edmands Park in which an unleashed dog has (unprovoked by me) run up to me and was aggressive to the point of my being concerned for my safety. Most times the dog's owner was indifferent or brushed off my concerns.

We want public land to be safe for everyone. We are NOT dog lovers and would like them to stay away from us.

Having a son who years ago was brought to the ground by an unleashed dog and a wife who is scared of dogs, it just makes no sense to me that a small minority of the population feels it's ok to monopolize such a wonderful place as the park. Feel free to walk your dog on a leash, but go to a dedicated dog park (like the one at the Cabot School field) and make everyone feel comfortable in the Woods.

I abut Edmands Park and have walked there for over 40 years.

I love dogs and I wish they could all run free in nature as they do on farms.

However, I have had the following experiences with off leash dogs:

Several repeatedly attacked a small dog I was walking and the owners could do nothing to stop them. I tried picking the dog up in my arms when aggressive dogs approached but I felt intimidated as the little dog shook with fear. I stopped walking the leashed dog in the park until I talked with other owners who (as a group) told an aggressive dog owner to walk elsewhere or else the woods would have to be patrolled. Peer pressure like that works well. That would not have been as effective if the park was officially off leash.

I have been bit on my leg by a dog while riding a bike and I have broken blood vessels on my thigh from a dog who kept jumping on me and did not respond to the owner's calls to stop. Other dogs jump up and leave muddy marks on my clothes. Owners try to stop them but it is usually too late. I have a large garden behind a stone wall near the woods, off leash dogs chase each other over the wall and tear up the flowers and have broken garden statuary... I yell, they do not respond, and no owners are close enough to hear or do anything about it.

As I aged I tried using walking sticks but that seems to anger some dogs and they growl at me. Dogs chasing each other on the path sometimes knock me off balance.

In the fall I often come home with dog poop on my shoes because off leash owners can't see where the dogs squat in the leaves on the path.

I am not the only one who has been chased out of the woods, we now have fox mother who chooses under our shed for her litter, and the ground hog who lives under the porch, raccoons and rabbits all seek protection from the dog filled woods. We used to have many duck families who raised young in the wetlands. This spring we had one brave or stupid duck who returned to this many generation nesting place but the off leash dogs leap into the vernal pools and waterways so wild things have retreated. I can't imagine people want to take those muddy paws home with them, even if they don't care about the wildlife disturbance. My preference is to leave the rules as they are in the woods. Not off leash but not heavily patrolled so well-trained dogs can walk **with their owners** off leash. Then owners will be vigilant about keeping track of their dogs and there will be peer pressure to leash dogs that are aggressive or not under voice control. It would be nice if owners thought about other wildlife trying to live in the woods too.
